Mentoring for Midcareer and Senior Faculty*

Mentoring offers a vital contribution to a successful academic career, but often is perceived as only suitable for new faculty. Post-tenure mentoring can support faculty in redefining scholarly and teaching goals, thinking outside of the box, and expanding the network of trusted colleagues who can address a variety of career issues.
